AUTHORIZE THE GENERAL MANAGER TO EXECUTE AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO TASK ORDER NO. 1 WITH MARK THOMAS & COMPANY, INC. FOR CONSTRUCTION INSPECTOR STAFF AUGMENTATION

This item was reviewed by the Budget & Finance Committee. Customer Service Coach Thow stated the Customer Service Team employs two full-time construction inspectors. One of the construction inspectors retired in March. Due to anticipated construction activities, staff determined it would be necessary to fill the vacant position on a temporary basis until the District would be able to recruit a permanent replacement. In June 2023, staff executed an agreement and Task Order No 1 with Mark Thomas in the amount of \$73,879 to provide a temporary construction inspector for three months. In June, the second construction inspector submitted their resignation. While a permanent solution is under evaluation, and during the recruitment process, staff requested Mark Thomas provide a second temporary construction inspector. The purpose of Amendment No. 1 to Task Order No. 1 is to provide a second full-time temporary construction inspector for three months from July through October 5, 2023, and to extend the duration of the first full-time temporary construction inspector for an additional month through October 5, Staff recommended the Board authorize the General Manager to execute Amendment No. 1 to Task Order No. 1 with Mark Thomas & Company, Inc. in the amount of \$100,812 for providing temporary construction inspectors.

This item was reviewed by the Engineering and Information Technology Committee. Technical Services Manager Chau stated the Board awarded the construction contract for the Alvarado Influent Pump Station Improvements Project to Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. on October 14, 2019; the Notice to Proceed was issued October 31, 2019. The Project experienced several delays, which were outlined in the Board meeting packet. Kiewit substantially completed the Project December 6, 2022, and all punch list work was successfully completed June 26, 2023. Staff recommended the Board consider a resolution to accept the construction of the Alvarado Influent Pump Station Improvements Project from Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. and authorize recordation of a Notice of Completion.









Cogen Power Produced (% of total Plant load)






Mechanics working on the cogeneration engine



- Category 4: Less than 50 gallons. Does not discharge to a surface water.

Collection System Maintenance Work Completed

The Collection Services Workgroup maintains over 839 miles of gravity sewer through cleaning and televised inspection. They also service 63 District vehicles and maintain 3 buildings. Maintenance of equipment is completed by staff through sewer line repairs and work orders.







Work Orders Initiated and Completed





Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board award the Hazardous Materials Management Services contract to AECOM Technical Services, Inc. in the amount of \$353,554.65.

Discussion

The California Environmental Protection Agency (CALEPA) requires the District to develop and maintain a hazardous materials business plan (HMBP), a spill prevention control and countermeasure plan (SPCC) as well as perform inspections for plan compliance and document those inspection results.

The District issued a Request for Proposal (RFP # S-23-S-313) in February of 2023 soliciting bids for Hazardous Materials Management Services. The District received proposals from two (2) service providers on March 7, 2023. The costs associated with each bid are shown in Table 1 below.

The length of the Hazardous Materials Management Services contract is 5 years in length and includes the following tasks:

- Review existing hazardous materials business plans (HMBP), spill prevention control and countermeasure (SPCC) plans, and hazardous waste storage and disposal logs.
- Evaluate existing hazardous waste and hazardous materials compliance practices at the District's main Plant and six (6) associated pump stations.
- Identify corrective actions required to achieve compliance with the HMBP and SPCC and assist with the implementation of those corrective actions.
- Develop processes and systems to maintain hazardous materials compliance in the future (as regulations change).
- Provide ongoing compliance monitoring services which consists of a combination of weekly and monthly site inspections of District facilities to ensure the District is complying with HMBPs and SPCCs.
- Scheduling hazardous waste pick-ups and signing off on hazardous waste manifests.

Background

The District has been contracting for hazardous materials management services since CALEPA first required the District to develop HBMP and SPCC to ensure compliance with CALEPA regulations. AECOM Technical Services, Inc., is the District's current hazardous material service provider and Staff is satisfied with AECOM's performance.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a force main maintenance agreement with the East Bay Dischargers Authority (EBDA).

Discussion

EBDA approached the District in early 2023 about contracting for preventative maintenance of the EBDA force main between USD and the Oro Loma Effluent Pump Station (OLEPS). The City of San Leandro is currently providing these maintenance services but no longer has the resources necessary.

As such, EBDA staff is requesting to shift the majority of force main preventative maintenance from San Leandro to the District. Under this proposal, San Leandro would continue to maintain the force main segment from OLEPS to the San Leandro Effluent Pump Station (SLEPS), and the District would perform maintenance on the segment from USD to OLEPS.

The attached proposed agreement was developed by USD in consultation with EBDA staff. The key terms of the agreement are:

- Labor costs will be reimbursed at an overhead multiplier of 2.0.
- Materials and supplies will include a 10% markup.
- Vehicle usage will be billed to EBDA at a periodically reviewed rate schedule set by the District (attached to agreement).

- The agreement will become effective 60 days after the execution date to allow the District to hire an additional FTE to accommodate the resulting workload.
- The term of the agreement is 10 years.
- Either party may terminate the agreement without cause after providing a written notice 12 months in advance.
- In the event that EBDA requests the District to provide additional services, the District will bill for the services pursuant to the Compensation section of the agreement.
- EBDA shall be responsible for investigating spills from the EBDA Force Main and filing or reporting any California Integrated Water Quality System (CIWQS).
- District staff shall be responsible for investigating spills occurring as a result of actions by District staff.

The EBDA Commission has considered and approved the agreement at their regularly scheduled meeting on July 20, 2023.

Background

EBDA relies on Member Agency staff to operate and maintain its infrastructure, under the direction of EBDA's Operations & Maintenance (O&M) Manager. Historically, the City of San Leandro (San Leandro) has performed O&M of the Marina Dechlorination Facility (MDF) and the San Leandro Effluent Pump Station (SLEPS), provided laboratory services, and performed preventative maintenance on the majority of EBDA's force main.

Oro Loma Sanitary District (OLSD) has performed O&M for the Oro Loma Effluent Pump Station (OLEPS), City of Hayward (Hayward) has performed O&M for the Hayward Effluent Pump Station (HEPS), and USD has performed O&M for the Union Effluent Pump Station (UEPS) and performed preventative maintenance on the southern-most segment of EBDA's force main. The Member Agencies provide, and are reimbursed for, these services under agreements with EBDA.

The proposed agreement focuses specifically on maintenance of the force main. EBDA staff is working with USD to develop a new O&M agreement for the UEPS separate and apart from the proposed force main agreement. To keep the Member Agencies' agreements with EBDA identical, the USD O&M agreements are drafted to be consistent with the new agreements with Hayward for HEPS, OLSD for OLEPS, and San Leandro for continuing lab, MDF, and newly revised force main services.



FORCE MAIN MAINTENANCE SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Force Main Maintenance Services Agreement ("Ag	greement") by and between Unior
Sanitary District, a California sanitary district ("District"), and t	he East Bay Dischargers Authority
a joint powers agency ("EBDA") is entered into as of	(the "Execution Date")
District and EBDA may hereinafter be referred to individually	as a "Party" or collectively as the
"Parties."	

Recitals:

WHEREAS, EBDA requires assistance maintaining EBDA's force main connecting the UEPS with the Marina Dechlorination Facility in San Leandro (the "EBDA Force Main").

WHEREAS, District desires to provide routine maintenance services of the EBDA Force Main and additional maintenance tasks, subject to reimbursement of District's costs, as provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the matters contained in this Agreement, EBDA and District mutually agree as follows:

1. Scope of Services.

- Agreement, District agrees to assign employees to provide routine maintenance services on the EBDA Force Main, as set forth and according to the schedule in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference ("Routine Services"), as may be updated from time to time by mutual agreement of the Parties. District agrees to furnish labor, materials, tools, equipment, and incidental and customary work necessary to fully and adequately perform and complete the Routine Services. The Routine Services shall be performed in accordance with EBDA's and USD's Preventive Maintenance Procedures. District shall notify EBDA of any deficiencies observed. District shall be compensated as set forth in Section 3 below.
- 1.2 <u>Additional Services</u>. EBDA may request District to provide additional services in addition to the Routine Services (the "Additional Services"). Any Additional Services must be documented in writing from EBDA, such as an email, and shall be acknowledged by the District. District shall be compensated for Additional Services as set forth in Section 3, or as specified in the written Task Order.
- **1.3** Emergency Services. District shall perform services in the event of an emergency, damage or other time-sensitive issue impacting the EBDA Force Main as set forth below, which services are collectively defined as the "Emergency Services."
- **1.4** <u>Performance of Services</u>. The Routine Services, Additional Services and Emergency Services shall collectively hereinafter be referred to as the "Services."
- a. In the event that District discovers damage to, a defect in, or other concern with the EBDA Force Main during the performance of the Services that requires

timely resolution, the District shall notify the EBDA Contract Administrator, as defined in Section 8, and await direction from EBDA. District shall perform Emergency Services under this subsection (a) as directed by EBDA, and such Emergency Services shall be documented in a Task Order executed by the Parties as soon as practicable.

- b. If, in the event of an area-wide emergency, such as an earthquake or other natural disaster, EBDA notifies District and requests assistance with the EBDA Force Main, District will first assess its own facilities and ability to respond and reply to EBDA's request within 24 hours with an estimate of when District resources would be able to assist. District shall perform Emergency Services under this subsection (b) as directed by EBDA, and such Emergency Services shall be documented in writing from EBDA, such as an email, and shall be acknowledged by the District as soon as practicable.
- c. If EBDA notifies District of an asset failure, damage or spill concerning the EBDA Force Main and requests assistance from the District, District will respond as soon as possible, but within four (4) hours. District shall perform Emergency Services under this subsection (c) as directed by EBDA, and such Emergency Services shall be documented in writing from EBDA, such as an email, and shall be acknowledged by the District as soon as practicable.
- d. If District determines, in its sole judgement, that it is unable to respond to EBDA's request for District to perform Services, District shall notify EBDA as soon as possible and inform EBDA of when District will be able to perform the requested Services. District's inability to perform Services shall not be considered a breach of this Agreement.
- 1.5 <u>Unsafe or Hazardous Condition</u>. District is not required to perform the Services in the event that an unsafe or hazardous condition exists or is created by the EBDA Force Main, and District shall not be in breach of this Agreement for failure to perform due to an unsafe or hazardous condition. At the written request of EBDA, such as an email, the District may resolve such issues as an Additional Service, prior to performing the Services.
- **2.** Effective Date. This Agreement shall be effective sixty days (60) after the Execution Date ("Effective Date") and shall continue in full force and effect for a period of ten (10) years, unless earlier terminated by EBDA or District as provided herein. This Agreement may be extended by written agreement of both Parties.

3. Compensation.

- **3.1** <u>Compensation for Services</u>. EBDA shall compensate District for the Services performed as follows:
- a. All direct salary costs at the hourly rate maintained by District plus overhead. Overhead costs are defined as those costs to cover all non-productive time and fringe benefits measured by or applicable to the time of performance of such direct salary, including but not limited to, worker's compensation insurance, social security, state and federal unemployment insurance, medical insurance, salary continuation insurance, pension plan costs and allowances for vacation, sick leave and holiday pay allowable under federal and state law. The overhead rate shall be 2.0.

- b. All equipment costs in accordance with the Rate Schedule for Vehicles attached as Exhibit C, which shall be periodically updated at the discretion of the District, with notice to EBDA. Vehicle rates shall apply when vehicles are in active use and shall not include idle time.
- c. Costs of materials and supplies based on invoice or approved rate plus 10 percent administrative cost.
- 3.2 <u>Billing</u>. The District will submit monthly invoices together with an itemized statement of Services provided, as soon as practicable, but no later than_forty-five (45) days from the month the services were provided, or as otherwise agreed to by the Parties. The statement shall describe the Services provided, together with such other reasonable detail and supporting documentation as may be required by EBDA. EBDA will pay all invoiced charges within thirty (30) days of receiving a valid invoice.
- **3.3** <u>Maintenance of Records</u>. District shall maintain all financial and payroll records in accordance with District's standard practices and make them available to EBDA upon request.
- 4. <u>District Employees</u>. No relationship of employer and employee is created by this Agreement, it being understood that District staff providing assistance to EBDA under this Agreement are and will remain District employees and neither District nor any of its employees or representatives shall have any claim under this Agreement or otherwise against EBDA, its officers, agents, or employees, for retirement benefits, vacation pay, sick leave, retirement benefits, social security, or unemployment insurance benefits or employee benefits of any kind. District staff shall continue to be covered by District worker's compensation insurance during any Services provided pursuant to this Agreement, and District assumes full responsibility for complying with all applicable CalPERS contributions and related reporting requirements.
- **5.** <u>Control of Services</u>. EBDA agrees that all Services shall be performed by District, unless otherwise approved in writing by EBDA. The personnel performing the Services under this Agreement on behalf of District shall at all times be under District's exclusive direction and control. District will determine the means, methods and details of performing the Services subject to the requirements of this Agreement.
- **6.** <u>Safety</u>. District shall perform the Services, and maintain its work area, so as to avoid injury or damage to any person or property while performing the Services only and shall otherwise exercise all necessary precautions for the safety of employees appropriate to the nature of the work and the conditions under which the Services are to be performed.

7. <u>EBDA Responsibilities.</u>

7.1 <u>EBDA Force Main</u>. EBDA shall be responsible for the safety and condition of the EBDA Force Main and shall provide District with its 2018 Transport System Condition Assessment as an inventory of the EBDA Force Main and its condition prior to the Effective Date. As set forth in Section 1.3 above, the District is not required to perform the Services in the event an unsafe or hazardous condition exists or is created by the EBDA Force Main. District's performance of Services hereunder shall not create an ongoing obligation for District

to, or relieve EBDA's obligation to, maintain EBDA Force Main in a safe condition and good working order.

- 7.2 Reporting. EBDA shall continue to be responsible for investigating spills from the EBDA Force Main and filing or reporting any California Integrated Water Quality System (CIWQS) or others reports required in connection with any spill at any of the EBDA Force Main, unless such spill occurs as a result of actions by District staff, in which case the District shall be responsible for investigating but not submitting the CWIQS report as the District is not the owner of the facilities. District shall cooperate in any investigation as reasonably requested by EBDA.
- 8. <u>Contract Administration</u>. EBDA's General Manager or their designee ("EBDA Contract Administrator") shall administer this Agreement on behalf of EBDA, and District's General Manager or their designee shall administer this Agreement on behalf of District ("District Contract Administrator"). Contract administration shall include the negotiation and execution of Task Orders for Additional Services. EBDA's Contract Administrator shall also provide direction regarding Emergency Services.

9. Indemnification and Hold Harmless.

- 9.1 <u>District Indemnity</u>. District hereby agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless EBDA and its elected and appointed officials, officers, officials, agents, employees and representatives from and against any and all claims, losses, liabilities or damages, demands and actions, including payment of reasonable attorney's fees, to the extent arising out of or resulting from any negligent or willful act or omission performed by District, or any of its officers, agents, employees, or anyone directly or indirectly acting on behalf of District under this Agreement.
- 9.2 EBDA Indemnity. EBDA hereby agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless District and its elected and appointed officials, officers, officials, agents, employees and representatives from and against any and all claims, losses, liabilities or damages, demands and actions, including payment of reasonable attorney's fees, arising out of or resulting from the performance of this Agreement, to the extent arising out of or resulting from the condition of the EBDA Force Main, or any negligent or willful act or omission by EBDA, or any of its officers, agents, employees, or anyone directly or indirectly acting on behalf of EBDA under this Agreement.
- **10.** <u>Insurance</u>. Each Party shall maintain insurance as set forth in <u>Exhibit B</u>, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

11. <u>Termination</u>.

11.1 <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. Either Party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause by providing written notice to the other Party no earlier than one (1) year from the termination date. In the event of termination for convenience, termination shall be effective the later of one (1) year after delivery of a termination notice or such other date as may be set forth in the termination notice.

- 11.2 <u>Termination for Cause</u>. Either Party may terminate this Agreement in whole or part for default should the other Party commit a material breach of this Agreement, and such breach has not been cured within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of notice by the Party demanding such cure, or if the breach cannot be cured within such thirty (30)-day period, the breaching Party has commenced a cure and cures to completion within a reasonable time period. In the event of termination for cause, termination shall be deemed effective sixty (60) days after delivery of a termination notice.
- **11.3** Payment to District Up to Termination. In the event of termination for convenience or for cause, District will be entitled to payment for all Services up to the effective date of the termination.
- **12.** <u>Status of Parties</u>. District is a California sanitary district and EBDA is a joint powers agency organized and operating pursuant to the statutes of the State of California. The Parties are thus separate legal entities and independent parties. District shall have no authority, express or implied, pursuant to this Agreement to bind EBDA to any obligation whatsoever. Similarly, EBDA shall have no authority, express or implied, pursuant to this Agreement to bind District to any obligation whatsoever.
- **13.** <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. District shall keep itself fully informed of and in compliance with all local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations in any manner affecting the performance of the Services, including all Cal/OSHA requirements, and shall give all notices required by law.
- **14. Governing Law; Venue**. The interpretation, validity, and enforcement of this Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California except with reference to its choice of laws principles. Any suit, claim, or legal proceeding of any kind related to this Agreement shall be filed and heard in a court of competent jurisdiction in the County of Alameda.
- 15. Notices. Any notice or communication required or authorized by this Agreement shall be in writing and may be delivered personally or by registered mail, return receipt requested, to the entities and addresses listed below. Notice shall be deemed to have been given and received upon the date of actual delivery, if delivered personally, or the date of delivery, if delivered by registered mail. Either Party to this Agreement may at any time, upon notice to the other party, designate any other person or address in substitution of the person and address to which such notice or communication shall be given.

16. <u>Integration and Modification</u>. This Agreement represents the entire integrated agreement between EBDA and District, supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements either written or oral, between the Parties, and may be amended only by written instrument signed by the EBDA and District.

- **17. Severability**. If any term of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the Agreement shall be construed as not containing that term, and the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect; provided, however, this section shall not be applied to the extent that it would result in a frustration of the Parties' intent under this Agreement.
- **18.** <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to give any rights or benefits to any third party.
- **19.** No Party Drafter; Captions. The provisions of this Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to their common meaning and not strictly for or against any Party. Any caption preceding the text of any section, paragraph or subsection is included only for convenience of reference and shall be disregarded in the construction and interpretation of this Agreement.
- **20.** <u>Assignment Prohibited</u>. Neither the District nor EBDA may assign any right or obligation pursuant to this Agreement. Any attempted or purported assignment of any right or obligation hereunder shall be void and of no effect.
- **21.** Authority. The individuals executing this Agreement represent and warrant that they have the right, power, legal capacity, and authority to enter into and to execute this Agreement on behalf of the respective legal entities of District and EBDA.
- **22.** <u>Counterparts</u>. The Parties recognize and agree that separate counterpart signature pages may be used but that all such pages constitute one and the same Agreement.

Recommendation

Receive information and provide direction regarding sanitary sewer main replacement located on the parcel at 800 East Warren Avenue in the City of Fremont.

Discussion

The parcel at 800 East Warren Avenue is currently being developed for a 3,500 square-foot single family home and an attached accessory dwelling unit (ADU). The parcel is located on a hillside and is generally sloped to the west to southwest direction. The parcel includes existing easements for a USD sewer main and manhole, City of Fremont storm drain pipeline, and PG&E electrical facilities, and two existing City of Fremont slope easements located on the southwestern portion of the parcel that is adjacent to the Caltrans right-of-way. Please refer to Exhibit A for a site plan of the parcel.

The home and attached ADU were designed to be constructed on the northeastern portion of the parcel that is adjacent to East Warren Avenue. However, the new driveway will be constructed directly over the USD sewer easement.

The sewer easement was granted to USD in 1977 and allows USD access "for constructing, cleaning, repairing and maintaining said sanitary sewer appurtenances." An existing sanitary sewer main and sewer manhole are located within the sewer easement area. The easement allows the property owner to construct a driveway.

With construction of the new driveway, USD's Collection Services crews can still utilize the sewer easement to access the sewer manhole for maintenance activities. Because the location of this manhole is in a sloped terrain, USD's crews currently do not drive large vehicles, such as the vactor truck and CCTV van, to the manhole. Instead, USD can clean and CCTV the sewer main from the upstream manhole located in the intersection of East Warren Avenue and Yakima Drive. If necessary, USD's access to the manhole will be either with a pickup truck or by foot. Please refer to Figures 1 through 5 for photos of the site.

Given that the construction of the driveway will cross the sewer easement and main in two locations, staff thought it would be prudent to consider replacing the sewer main, which consists of 314 feet of 8-inch diameter clay pipe. Even though the pipe is currently in good condition, if USD were to replace it in the future, USD could incur additional costs to repair or replace the driveway, future landscaping, and/or other site improvements located over the easement.

USD explored two options to replace the pipe now:

- 1. Replace all 314 feet of clay pipe with PVC pipe by open-cut method and backfill over the portion of the new pipe under the driveway with a lean concrete mix to protect the structural integrity of the pipe.
- 2. Replace the first 145 feet of the clay pipe under the future driveway with PVC pipe by open-cut method and the remaining 169 feet of the clay pipe with HDPE pipe by pipe bursting method. For the portion of the new pipe under the driveway, backfill with a lean concrete mix to protect the structural integrity of the pipe.

USD reached out to a contractor for budgetary estimates of both options. The table below summarizes the budgetary construction estimates of replacing the existing pipe before the driveway is constructed.

Description	Cost
Option No. 1 – Replace 314 feet of clay pipe with PVC pipe by	\$190,760

The house at 800 East Warren Avenue is currently under construction. The owner anticipates constructing the driveway in September 2023.

Staff is seeking the Board's direction on this matter. Should the Board agree to move forward with replacing the existing sewer main now, staff would recommend the expenditures come out of the CIP reserves as these costs were not included in the FY 24 operating or CIP budget. Staff is not recommending a budget amendment. If the Board concurs, staff will present a future staff report for a motion by the Board to consider authorizing expenditures of up to \$267,064 from

the FY 24 CIP reserves for the project to accommodate construction, unforeseen (10% of highest estimate) and soft costs (30% of highest estimate).

If authorized to proceed with the project, staff will obtain bids and coordinate the sewer main replacement activities with the owner's driveway construction. Staff anticipates the work can be completed this fall.

Background

In May 1992, the City of Fremont passed a resolution which mandated that if the parcel were to be developed, the developer/owner would be required to provide an alternative access easement to the City of Fremont to access the existing storm drain outfall located at the northern portion of the parcel.

Because the owner's new driveway will cross over the City of Fremont's storm drain easement, the owner has already granted the City a new access easement located along the southwesterly property line of the parcel. USD does not currently anticipate a need for this new access easement. However, if there is a need to utilize the new access easement in the future, USD could ask the City of Fremont to access it under the City's grant of easement or negotiate a grant of easement with the owner.



TITLE: Legislative Update on Issues of Interest to the Board

Background

The Board was last updated on legislative issues of interest at its December 12, 2022 meeting. Direction was received from the Board at the July 12, 2021, Board meeting to consolidate the regional and state/federal reports into one report to be presented twice annually.

REGIONAL NEWS:

Alameda County

 Elisa Márquez was unanimously appointed by the Alameda County Board of Supervisors on April 4, 2023 to represent the communities of District 2, which include Hayward, Union City, Newark, and portions of Fremont. Prior to serving on the Board of Supervisors, she served as a Hayward city councilmember beginning in 2014.

Fremont

Mayor Lily Mei delivered her State of the City address at a June 8, 2023 event. She noted the
City's growing revenues help to maintain essential services and contribute to the hiring of
additional staff to expand services and support public safety. She highlighted the City's
assistance to 130 small businesses through emergency grants as well as helping small
businesses apply for federal, state, and regional opportunities.

The Mayor noted advancement of over a dozen commercial development projects and the City's growing manufacturing community consisting of both new and expanded existing companies, stating Fremont had record-level investment in industrial areas with 2.5 million square feet of new projects, with an additional 400,000 square feet of manufacturing and research and development space close to breaking ground.

Also highlighted were the City's Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) targets of 13,000 residential units for the City as well as several affordable housing developments moving forward. The Mayor noted new State legislation permitting residential uses within all commercial districts in California and streamlining development review timelines.

Among many topics, the Mayor noted various economic development activities, new public safety officials, staff, and programs, green initiatives, the City's response to winter storms as well as further efforts for emergency preparedness, and activities in Fremont's various Districts.

Newark


• Mayor Michael Hannon delivered his State of the City address at an April 27, 2023 event. He discussed impacts to the City budget from effects of the COVID emergency such as lower revenues from Utility tax and Hotel taxes but noted that FY 23 is estimated to result in a modest budget surplus. The City's funds primarily come from property and sales taxes, and with current construction and high property valuations, revenues have risen. The Mayor also noted Newark received \$11.8 million from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), which provided funds for cities impacted by the COVID emergency. A portion of the funds (\$4.8 million) were used to restore city personnel and operations, with the balance going toward seven community projects to serve constituents disproportionally impacted by the health emergency.

The Mayor highlighted several initiatives such as Old Town Newark business assistance and façade improvements, \$1.8 million received from the State for broadband, monies directed to Community Development for permitting, funds for non-profits grant programs affected by the pandemic, grants to businesses, and funding directed toward attaining a new Chamber of Commerce CEO.

Mayor Hannon noted that in the next seven years, the city is expected to add 5,000 to its population. He highlighted several senior and affordable housing projects, New Park Place, which is a repurposing of the New Park Mall into residential units and a Costco, and several additional developments.

Union City

• In May, the City of Union City's Public Works Director Marilou Ayupan presented information to the Union City Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors about the Union City Boulevard Bike Lanes Project. The project will run from the City's border near Ardenwood Boulevard to Smith Street. Ayupan stated the project will improve bike and pedestrian access and crossings, street lighting, and drainage on Union City Boulevard and will complete pavement rehabilitation and provide better access to regional trails and parks. STATEWIDE ISSUES:

Initiative #21-0042A1 (aka #1935):

Limits Ability of Voters and State and Local Governments to Raise Revenues for Government Services. Initiative Constitutional Amendment.

On February 1, 2023, California Secretary of State Shirley Weber issued a memo to all county clerks/registrars of voters announcing that proponents of Initiative 21-0042A1, or Initiative 1935 as now numbered by the Secretary of State, had filed the necessary number of valid signatures to make it eligible for the November 5, 2024 General Election ballot. Proponents now have until June 27, 2024 to consider withdrawing the initiative before the Secretary of State officially certifies it for the ballot. It could be up to a year before we know if a legislative compromise is reached to avoid the initiative.

According to the California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CSDA), the purported "Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act," a statewide initiative measure to amend the California Constitution sponsored by the California Business Roundtable ("CBRT"), is the most consequential proposal to limit the ability of the state and local governments to enact, modify, or expand taxes, assessments, fees, and property-related charges since the passage of Proposition 218 (1996) and Proposition 26 (2010). CSDA states that, if enacted, public agencies would face a drastic rise in litigation that could severely restrict their ability to meet essential services and infrastructure needs.

Summary:

- This Ballot Initiative would restrict the ability of local agencies and the State of California to fund services and infrastructure by:
 - Adopting new and stricter rules for raising taxes, fees, assessments, and property-related fees.
 - Amending the State Constitution, including portions of Propositions 13, 218, and 26 among other provisions, to the advantage of the initiative's proponents and plaintiffs; creating new grounds to challenge these funding sources and disrupting fiscal certainty.
 - Restricting the ability of local governments to issue fines and penalties to corporations and property owners that violate local environmental, water quality, public health, public safety, fair housing, nuisance and other laws and ordinances.

The initiative includes provisions that would retroactively void *all* state and local taxes or fees adopted after January 1, 2022 if they did not align with the provisions of this initiative. This may also affect indexed fees that adjust over time for inflation or other factors. Effectively, it would allow voters throughout California to invalidate the prior actions of local voters, undermining local control and voter-approved decisions about investments needed in their communities.

STATE BUDGET:

Governor Newsom and legislative leaders announced on June 26, 2023 that they reached a deal on the State Budget, a \$310 billion spending plan, noting it protects core programs and covers a \$30 billion-plus deficit without dipping into key reserves. Negotiations were delayed by the governor's demands to include an extensive infrastructure proposal opposed by many lawmakers. The State Senate gave final approval on Wednesday, July 5, 2023 to Governor Newsom's package of infrastructure bills, which he signed into law on Monday July 10, 2023. The bills will streamline the permitting process for bridges, railways, and other major projects (excluding a proposed water conveyance tunnel under the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta).

Lawmakers also passed more than 20 related bills on June 27, 20223. Any leftover "budget trailer bills" that flesh out specific programs in the main budget must be passed by September 14, 2023. The Governor has until October 14, 2023, to sign or veto bills, but budget adjustments can continue to be made into 2024.

About \$10 billion in programs that will help the state reach its zero-emission vehicle mandate remain in the new budget agreement. Newsom finance spokesperson H.D. Palmer said an additional \$888 million for climate-related projects outside of the original climate budget had also been added to the final deal.

Newsom has stated he is seeking federal climate funding from the Inflation Reduction Act and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. He asked the Legislature to seek voters' approval of a climate bond, ranging from \$6 to \$16 billion.

The final budget also restores \$50 million to a grant program helping homeowners get started building secondary units (ADUs).

In the Governor's May Budget Revision, the Administration's deficit projection assumed that \$42 billion in additional revenue receipts will appear by October. This is the revenue amount the Administration estimates were delayed after California issued an extension for state tax returns due to the onslaught of extreme storms in early 2023.

STATE LEGISLATIVE BILLS

SURPLUS LAND

AB 480 (Ting) Surplus Land.

Position: CASA - Oppose unless amended; CSDA - Oppose unless amended 2

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

 Current law prescribes requirements for the disposal of surplus land by a local agency, as defined, and requires, except as provided, a local agency disposing of surplus land to comply with certain notice requirements before disposing of the land or participating in negotiations to dispose of the land with a prospective transferee, particularly that the local agency send a notice of availability to specified entities that have notified the Department of Housing and Community Development of their interest in surplus land, as specified. Under current law, if the local agency receives a notice of interest, the local agency is required to engage in good faith negotiations with the entity desiring to purchase or lease the surplus land. Current law requires a local agency to take formal action in a regular public meeting to declare that land is surplus and is not necessary for the agency's use and to declare land as either "surplus land" or "exempt surplus land," as supported by written findings, before a local agency may take any action to dispose of it consistent with an agency's policies or procedures. This bill would recast that provision and would exempt a local agency, in specified instances, from making a declaration at a public meeting for land that is "exempt surplus land" if the local agency identifies the land in a notice that is published and available for public comment at least 30 days before the exemption takes effect.

SB 747 (Caballero) Land use: economic development: surplus land.

Position: CASA – Support if amended; CSDA – Support if amended 2; League of California Cities – Support

Status: In Assembly Appropriations

Summary:

Current law authorizes a city, county, or city and county, with the approval of its legislative
body by resolution after a public hearing, to acquire, sell, or lease property in furtherance of
the creation of an economic opportunity, as defined. Current law specifies the Legislature's
intent regarding those provisions. This bill would authorize a city, county, or city and county,
in addition to a sale or lease, to otherwise transfer property to create an economic
opportunity. The bill would make related, conforming changes. The bill would additionally
state the Legislature's intent is to ensure that residents of the state have access to jobs that

allow them to afford housing without the need for public subsidies.

The current version of this bill would define the term "dispose" for these purposes to mean the sale of the surplus property or a lease of any surplus property entered into on or after January 1, 2024, for a term longer than 15 years, including renewal options, as specified. The bill would also redefine the term "agency's use" to include use for transit or transit-oriented development, property owned by a port that is used to support logistics uses, airports, state tidelands, sites for broadband equipment or wireless facilities, and waste disposal sites. The bill would define a district relative to an "agency's use" to include infrastructure financing districts, enhanced infrastructure financing districts, community revitalization and investment authorities, transit village development districts, and climate resilience districts if the land is located within a city, county, or city and county that has been found to have a substantially compliant housing element and has been designated prohousing by the Department of Housing and Community Development, as specified.

A coalition of associations has requested an amendment to increase the lease term in the definition of dispose from fifteen (15) years to a more reasonable length of time, consistent with local agency planning and operations.

HOUSING/FEES

AB 516 (Ramos) Mitigation Fee Act: fees for improvements: expenditure reports and audits.

Position: CASA – Work with author; CSDA – Concerns

Status: Senate Floor

Summary:

The Mitigation Fee Act imposes certain requirements on a local agency that imposes a fee as a condition of approval of a development project that is imposed to provide for an improvement to be constructed to serve the development project, or a fee for public improvements, as specified. In this regard, the Mitigation Fee Act requires the local agency to deposit the fee in a separate capital facilities account or fund, and to make certain information about the account or fund public annually, as specified. The Mitigation Fee Act requires that information to include an identification of an approximate date by which the construction of the public improvement will commence if the local agency determines that sufficient funds have been collected to complete financing on an incomplete public improvement, as specified. The Mitigation Fee Act also requires that information to include the amount of refunds made to the owners of the lots or units of the development project, as specified. This bill would require the report to include an identification of each public improvement identified in a previous report, whether construction began on the approximate date noted in the previous report, the reason for the delay, if any, and a revised approximate date that the local agency will commence construction, if applicable. The bill would also require the report to include the numbers of persons or entities identified to receive refunds.

AB 1033 (Ting) Accessory dwelling units: local ordinances: separate sale or conveyance.

Position: CASA - Neutral as amended; CSDA - Watch; League of CA Cities - Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

• The Planning and Zoning Law authorizes a local agency, by ordinance or ministerial approval, to provide for the creation of accessory dwelling units in areas zoned for residential use, as specified. Current law requires the ordinance to include specified standards, including prohibiting the accessory dwelling unit from being sold or otherwise conveyed separate from the primary residence, except as provided by a specified law. Current law, notwithstanding the prohibition described above, requires a local agency to allow an accessory dwelling unit to be sold or conveyed separately from the primary residence to a qualified buyer if certain conditions are met, including that the property was built or developed by a qualified nonprofit corporation and that the property is held pursuant to a recorded tenancy in common agreement that meets specified requirements. This bill would, in addition, authorize a local agency to adopt a local ordinance to allow the separate conveyance of the primary dwelling unit and accessory dwelling unit or units as condominiums, as specified, and would make conforming changes.

Legislative analysis notes that local agencies deciding to allow separate conveyance will have to update their ADU ordinances to specify that these newly separated residential units are subject to rules for condominiums in the Davis-Stirling Common Interest Development Act and Subdivision Map Act. The analysis also notes AB 1033 allows a local agency, special district, or water corporation to require the applicant to install a new or separate utility connection directly between the ADU and the utility and can also impose a connection fee or capacity charge.

AB 1490 (Lee) Affordable housing development projects: adaptive reuse.

Position: CASA – Work with author; CSDA – Neutral; League of CA Cities – Oppose unless amended Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

Under this bill, a housing development that is, among other requirements, an extremely affordable adaptive reuse project on an infill parcel that is not located on or adjoined to a site where more than 1/3 of the square footage on the site is dedicated to industrial use, as specified, would be an allowable use, regardless of any inconsistencies between the project and any local plans, zoning, or regulations, and limits local governments from imposing maximum density or floor area ratio requirements, and any requirement to add additional parking or open space. The bill would authorize a local agency to impose objective design review standards, except as specified. The bill would authorize a local agency to deny the project if it is proposed to be located on a site or adjoined to any site where any of the square footage on the site is dedicated to industrial use and the local agency makes written findings that approving the development would have an adverse effect on public health and safety. The bill would provide that for purposes of the Housing Accountability Act, a proposed housing development project is consistent, compliant, and in conformity with an applicable plan, program, policy, ordinance, standard, requirement, or other similar provision if the housing development project is consistent with the standards specified in these provisions. The bill would require a local agency to determine whether the proposed development meets those standards within specified timeframes. The bill would define an

"extremely affordable adaptive reuse project" for these purposes to mean a multifamily housing development project that involves retrofitting and repurposing of a residential or commercial building that currently allows temporary dwelling or occupancy, and that meets specified affordability requirements, including that 100% of the units be dedicated to lower income households, 50% of which shall be dedicated to very low income households, as specified.

WATER

SB 366 (Caballero) The California Water Plan: long-term supply targets.

Position: CASA – Support if amended; CSDA – Support 3

Status: Converted to 2-year bill - may be acted upon January 2024

Summary:

 Current law requires the Department of Water Resources to update every 5 years the plan for the orderly and coordinated control, protection, conservation, development, and use of the water resources of the state, which is known as "The California Water Plan." Current law requires the department to include a discussion of various strategies in the plan update, including, but not limited to, strategies relating to the development of new water storage facilities, water conservation, water recycling, desalination, conjunctive use, water transfers, and alternative pricing policies that may be pursued in order to meet the future needs of the state. Current law requires the department to establish an advisory committee to assist the department in updating the plan. This bill would revise and recast certain provisions regarding The California Water Plan to, among other things, require the department to instead establish a stakeholder advisory committee and to expand the membership of the committee to include tribes, labor, and environmental justice interests. The bill would require the department, in coordination with the California Water Commission, the State Water Resources Control Board, other state and federal agencies as appropriate, and the stakeholder advisory committee to develop a comprehensive plan for addressing the state's water needs and meeting specified long-term water supply targets established by the bill for purposes of "The California Water Plan."

SOURCE CONTROL

AB 1628 (McKinnor) Microfiber filtration

Position: CASA – Support; CSDA – Watch; League of California Cities - Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

• Would require, on and after January 1, 2029, that all new washing machines offered for sale in California for residential, commercial, or state use contain a microfiber filtration system, as defined, with a mesh size not greater than 100 micrometers.

CARBON SEQUESTRATION

AB 45 (Boerner) Coastal resources: coastal development permits: blue carbon demonstration projects.

Position: CASA - Referred to ACE Committee; CSDA - Watch; League of CA Cities: Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

• The California Coastal Act of 1976, among other things, requires anyone wishing to perform or undertake any development in the coastal zone, except as specified, in addition to obtaining any other permit required by law from any local government or from any state, regional, or local agency, to obtain a coastal development permit from the California Coastal Commission, as provided. This bill would authorize the commission to authorize blue carbon demonstration projects, as defined, in order to demonstrate and quantify the carbon sequestration potential of these projects to help inform the state's natural and working lands and climate resilience strategies. The bill would, among other things, authorize the commission to require an applicant with a project that impacts coastal wetland, subtidal, intertidal, or marine habitats or ecosystems to build or contribute to a blue carbon demonstration project.

"Blue carbon" is defined by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) as the term for carbon captured by the world's ocean and coastal ecosystems. The most recent legislative analysis regarding this bill notes that despite California's loss of approximately 90% of its wetlands, recent estimates indicate that roughly 13.4 million tons of carbon are stored in the state's coastal wetlands.

PFAS

AB 246 (Papan) Product safety: menstrual products: perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances.

Position: CASA - Support; CSDA - Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

 Would, beginning January 1, 2025, prohibit any person or entity from manufacturing, distributing, selling, or offering for sale in the state any menstrual products that contain regulated PFAS, and requires a manufacturer to use the least toxic alternative when removing regulated PFAS in menstrual products to comply with these provisions. The bill would require a manufacturer of a menstrual product to provide persons that offer the product for sale or distribution in the state with a certificate of compliance stating that the menstrual product is in compliance with these provisions and does not contain any regulated PFAS.

AB 727 (Weber) Product safety: cleaning products: perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances.

Position: CASA – Support and Co-Sponsor; CSDA – Watch; League of CA Cities - Watch Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

 Would, beginning January 1, 2026, prohibit a person or entity from manufacturing, selling, delivering, distributing, holding, or offering for sale in the state a cleaning product that contains regulated perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), as specified. The bill would make a violation of these provisions punishable by a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000 for a first violation and not to exceed \$10,000 for each subsequent violation, upon an action brought by the Attorney General, a city attorney, a county counsel, or a district attorney.

GOVERNANCE

AB 557 (Hart) Open meetings: local agencies: teleconferences.

Position: CASA - Support coalition; CSDA - Sponsor; League of CA Cities - Sponsor

Status: In Senate floor process

Summary:

 The Ralph M. Brown Act requires, with specified exceptions, that all meetings of a legislative body of a local agency, as those terms are defined, be open and public and that all persons be permitted to attend and participate. The act contains specified provisions regarding providing for the ability of the public to observe and provide comment. The act allows for meetings to occur via teleconferencing subject to certain requirements, particularly that the legislative body notice each teleconference location of each member that will be participating in the public meeting, that each teleconference location be accessible to the public, that members of the public be allowed to address the legislative body at each teleconference location, that the legislative body post an agenda at each teleconference location, and that at least a quorum of the legislative body participate from locations within the boundaries of the local agency's jurisdiction. The act provides an exemption to the jurisdictional requirement for health authorities, as defined. This bill would revise the authority of a legislative body to hold a teleconference meeting under those abbreviated teleconferencing procedures when a declared state of emergency is in effect. Specifically, the bill would extend indefinitely that authority in the circumstances under which the legislative body either (1) meets for the purpose of determining whether, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, or (2) has previously made that determination.

AIR QUALITY/EMISSIONS

AB 1594 (Garcia) Medium and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles: public agency utilities.

Position: CASA – Support; CSDA – Support 3; League of California Cities: Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

• Executive Order No. N-79-20 establishes the goal of transitioning medium- and heavy-duty vehicles in California to zero-emission vehicles by 2045 for all operations where feasible and by 2035 for drayage trucks, and requires the State Air Resources Board to develop and propose medium- and heavy-duty vehicle regulations to meet that goal. This bill would require any state regulation that seeks to require, or otherwise compel, the procurement of medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles by a public agency utility to ensure that those vehicles can support a public agency utility's ability to maintain reliable water and electric services, respond to disasters in an emergency capacity, and provide mutual aid assistance statewide and nationwide, among other requirements. The bill would define a public agency utility to

include a local publicly owned electric utility, a community water system, and a wastewater treatment provider, as specified. This bill contains other existing laws.

AB 985 (Arambula) San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District: emission reduction credit system.

Position: CASA – Oppose unless amended; CSDA – Watch; League of CA Cities - Oppose Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

 Current law requires the board of every air district to establish by regulation a system by which all reductions in the emission of air contaminants that are to be used to offset certain future increases in the emission of air contaminants be banked prior to use to offset future increases in emissions, except as specified. Current law requires the state board to develop and adopt a methodology for use by air districts to calculate the value of credits issued for emission reductions from stationary, mobile, indirect, and areawide sources when those credits are used interchangeably, consistent with certain requirements. Current law also requires the State Air Resources Board to periodically update the methodology as it applies to future transactions, if necessary. Current law provides for the establishment of the San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District (APCD) vested with the authority to regulate air emissions from stationary sources located in the San Joaquin Valley Air Basin. This bill would require the state board, except as provided, to conduct an analysis of each credit identified in the San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District's ledger of available emission reduction credits to determine if any credits were issued in violation of state, local, or district laws, rules, regulations, or procedures in place at the time of original issuance, and to complete the analysis no later than January 1, 2027. The bill would require, upon completion of the analysis, the state board to submit a report to the Legislature that includes a summary of the results of the analysis.

Legislative analysis of this bill quotes opposition noting certain requirements and proposals within the bill would have it serve as a "de facto prohibition of all permitting projects for a wide array of projects and service industries such as wastewater management, composting facilities, and renewable energy projects."

AB 1216 (Muratsuchi) Wastewater treatment plants: monitoring of air pollutants.

Position: CASA – Oppose; CSDA - Watch

Status: In Senate Appropriations

Summary:

• Would require, on or before January 1, 2025, the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility that is located within 1,500 feet of a residential area and has an original design capacity of 425,000,000 gallons or more per day to develop, install, operate, and maintain a wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system in accordance with guidance developed by the appropriate air quality management district. The bill would require the wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system to include equipment capable of measuring pollutants of concern, including hydrogen sulfide, nitrogen oxides, and volatile organic compounds emitted to the atmosphere from

wastewater treatment or reclamation processes that the appropriate district deems appropriate for monitoring. The bill would also require the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility to collect real-time data from the wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system, to maintain records of that data, and to transmit the data to the appropriate air quality management district in accordance with the district's guidance. In addition, the bill would require, to the extent feasible, the data generated by these systems to be provided to the public as quickly as possible in a publicly accessible format.

ENERGY

AB 1550 (Bennett) Green Hydrogen.

Position: CASA – Oppose unless amended; CSDA - Watch Status: 2-year bill – may be acted upon January 2024

Summary:

Would require, on and after January 1, 2045, that all hydrogen produced and used in California for
the generation of electricity or fueling of vehicles be green hydrogen, as defined, in furtherance of
the state's policy to achieve net zero greenhouse gas emissions as soon as possible, but no later
than 2045. The bill would require the State Air Resources Board, in consultation with the Public
Utilities Commission and the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission,
to develop interim targets to ensure the state achieves that requirement. Because a violation of a
state board regulation implementing this requirement would be a crime, the bill would impose a
state-mandated local program.

PUBLIC WORKS

SB 745 (Cortese) The Drought-Resistant Buildings Act Position: CASA – Neutral as amended; CSDA – Neutral

Status: In Assembly Appropriations

Summary:

 Would require the California Building Standards Commission to research, develop, and propose building standards to reduce potable water use in new residential and nonresidential buildings, as specified. The bill would require the commission to perform a review of water efficiency and water reuse standards in the California Buildings Standards Code every 3 years, commencing with the next triennial edition, and update as needed.

AB 400 (Rubio) Local agency design-build projects: authorization.

Position: CASA - Watch; CSDA - Support 2; League of CA Cities - Sponsor

Status: In Concurrence with Senate amendments

Summary:

• Current law authorizes a local agency, as defined, with approval of its governing body, to procure design-build contracts for public works projects in excess of \$1,000,000, awarding the contract either to the lowest bid or the best value. "Local agency" is defined, in part, for this

purpose to include specified local and regional agencies responsible for the construction of transit projects, including any joint powers authority formed to provide transit service. Current law, among other requirements for the design-build procurement process, requires specified information submitted by a design-build entity to be certified under penalty of perjury. These provisions authorizing the use of the design-build procurement process are repealed on January 1, 2025. This bill would delete from the definition of "local agency" any joint powers authority formed to provide transit services and would instead expand that definition to include any joint powers authority responsible for the construction of transit projects, thereby authorizing additional joint powers authorities to use the above-described design-build procurement process. The bill would extend the repeal date to January 1, 2031.

SB 706 (Caballero) Public contracts: progressive design-build: local agencies Position: CASA – Watch close; CSDA – Support 2; League of CA Cities - Sponsor Status: In Assembly Appropriations

Summary:

Current law, until January 1, 2029, authorizes local agencies, defined as any city, county, city and county, or special district authorized by law to provide for the production, storage, supply, treatment, or distribution of any water from any source, to use the progressive design-build process for up to 15 public works projects in excess of \$5,000,000 for each project, similar to the progressive design-build process authorized for use by the Director of General Services. This bill would, until January 1, 2030, provide additional authority for cities, counties, cities and counties, or special districts to use the progressive design-build process for up to 10 public works projects in excess of \$5,000,000, not limited to water-related projects, excluding projects on state-owned or state-operated facilities. The bill would require information to be provided under penalty of perjury and would require similar reports due no later than December 31, 2028.

BOND ACTS:

AB 1567 (Garcia, et al.) Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparation, Flood Protection, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Clean Energy, and Workforce Development Bond Act of 2024.

Position: CASA - Support if amended; CSDA - Watch

Status: In Senate Natural Resources and Wildlife Committee

Summary:

 Places a \$15.955 billion climate resilience general obligation bond before the voters on the March 5, 2024, Primary Election ballot. If approved by the voters, the Act would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$15,995,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, wildfire prevention, drought preparation, flood protection, extreme heat mitigation, clean energy, and workforce development programs.

SB 867 (Allen, et. al.) Drought, Flood, and Water Resilience, Wildfire and Forest Resilience, Coastal Resilience, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Biodiversity and Nature-Based Climate Solutions,

Climate Smart Agriculture, Park Creation and Outdoor Access, and Clean Energy Bond Act of 2024.

Position: CASA – Support if amended; CSDA - Watch Status: In Assembly Natural Resources Committee

Summary:

Authorizes a \$15.5 billion climate resilience bond to be placed before voters at an unspecified election. If approved by the voters, the Act would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$15,500,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate smart agriculture, park creation and outdoor access, and clean energy programs.

FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE ISSUES OF NATIONAL INTEREST:

DRAFT PFAS LEGISLATION INTRODUCED

On June 22, 2023, Senators Tom Carper and Shelley Moore Capito, Chair and Ranking Member of the Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee, released draft per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) legislation for stakeholder comment. Overall, the draft outlines policies that support research and development into PFAS treatment and removal technologies, improving the scientific knowledge of the chemicals, and helping communities dealing with PFAS pollution.

The draft package does not include CERCLA liability exemption language for clean water agencies. Industry associations have expressed the need to include such liability exemptions for the wastewater sector as well as biosolids. NACWA staff noted that EPW Committee staff plan further bipartisan negotiations to discuss stakeholder comments, and that the committee will also receive EPA Technical Assistance (TA) on the bill.

LUMMIS BILLS – PFAS LIABILITY PROTECTION

On May 5, 2023, Senator Cynthia Lummis introduced five bills to ensure industries and municipalities are not subject to liability claims if the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designates per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) compounds as hazardous substances. The Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act would protect the water sector from liability for any PFAS designated as hazardous substances under CERCLA. The other bills would protect the agricultural sector, landfills and waste management, and airports. Her press release noted the covered entities in these bills either do not contribute to PFAS contamination or are required to use PFAS-containing substances through regulations. Lummis introduced this legislation in response to an August 2022 proposed EPA rule to designate two PFAS compounds as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA), also known as Superfund. This would subject any entity with PFAS contamination to potential CERCLA liability from the EPA and third parties. The Senator's press release regarding these bills included quotes from representatives of several different industries in support of the legislation, including the CEO of the National Association of Clean Water Agencies CEO Adam Krantz.

NPDES PERMIT REFORM BILL (H.R. 1181)

On February 7, 2023, Congressman John Garamendi reintroduced his bipartisan legislation to reform permitting for local wastewater treatment and water recycling projects. The legislation would extend the maximum term for National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits issued under the federal Clean Water Act from 5 to 10 years, to better reflect the project construction schedules for public agencies. The proposed legislation has received endorsements from several state and national associations. Representatives Ken Calvert and Eric Swalwell are co-sponsors.

WIPPES ACT (S. 1350/H.R. 2964)

On April 27, 2023, the Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act was reintroduced on a bipartisan basis in both the House and Senate. The bill would require wipes manufacturers to print a "Do Not Flush" label on their nonflushable wipes product packaging. The WIPPES' labeling requirements mirror those that are now CA law under AB 818. The California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA) worked with the sponsoring offices in developing the legislation.

The WIPPES Act is sponsored by Senators Jeff Merkley and Susan Collins and Representatives Lisa McClain and Mary Sattler Peltola. Senators Feinstein and Padilla have signed on in support. The legislation continues to have full support from the wipes industry, national clean water associations, and the National Stewardship Action Council.

STREAM ACT

On June 22, 2023, Senator Dianne Feinstein introduced the Support to Rehydrate the Environment, Agriculture and Municipalities (STREAM) Act, co-sponsored by Senators Mark Kelly and Kyrsten Sinema. The Senator's press release notes the Act would improve the West's water supply in several ways, including:

- Authorizes \$750 million for storage, \$300 million for water recycling, \$150 million for desalination, and \$100 million for drinking water for disadvantaged communities. This builds on the \$1.15 billion for storage, \$1 billion for water recycling and \$250 million for desalination in the bipartisan infrastructure law.
- In combination with the bipartisan infrastructure law, this funding would provide California
 with more than 1 million additional acre-feet of water per year on average, enough water for
 more than 6 million people, including:
 - 532,000 additional acre-feet from water recycling projects.
 - Approximately 400,000 additional acre-feet from offstream storage and groundwater storage projects (including construction of Sites Reservoir, expansion of Los Vaqueros Reservoir and the raising of B.F. Sisk Dam, plus other potential projects like the Sacramento Regional Groundwater Bank and Del Puerto Canyon Reservoir).
 - 85,000 additional acre-feet from water desalination projects.

The press release also notes the Act would provide financial incentives for storage and conveyance projects that enhance environmental benefits and expand drinking water access for disadvantaged communities as well as fund separate environmental restoration projects.

DEBT LIMIT RECAP

In late May, President Biden and Speaker McCarthy announced an agreement on a 2-year government budget in exchange for raising the debt ceiling. The agreement suspends the nation's \$31.4 trillion borrowing limit until 2025. The agreement included a complete funding freeze at Fiscal Year 2023 levels on non-defense spending through 2024, and a slight 1% increase in 2025.

The National Association of Clean Water Agencies (NACWA) notes for the clean water and other non-defense sectors, this deal will make it very difficult to secure any funding increases over the next two federal budget years. This is true both for existing programs like the State Revolving Funds and even more so for new/growing programs like low-income water customer assistance. The debt agreement also rescinded about \$30 billion in unutilized COVID relief funds from various federal programs. Those recissions do not appear to directly impact programs of interest to the water sector.

Non-defense spending is maintained at roughly the same level, aligning with the current 2023 levels for 2024. After 2025, budget caps will be replaced by spending targets, allowing a modest increase of about 1% in non-defense spending for 2025. Defense spending will increase to \$886 billion, which amounts to a 3% rise on this year.

Exact details regarding funding streams for key clean water programs such as the Clean Water SRF (CWSRF) will not be known until the final appropriations bills for FY 2024 are finalized in August or September. Moving forward, industry associations will monitor how an essential cap on CWSRF funding over the next two years may impact how many clean water earmarks Congress approves for FY24 and FY25.

Unspent COVID relief funds will be reclaimed as part of the deal. As the COVID emergency officially ended in early May 2023, the exact amount of the unspent funds is still unclear. However, the Congressional Budget Office has estimated it to be roughly \$30 billion.

The debt ceiling deal also included reforms of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) that are likely to speed up obtaining federal approvals and work requirement changes to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

EPA REGION 1 NPDES PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

EPA Region 1, serving Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont and 10 Tribal Nations, is inserting Operation and Maintenance (O&M) climate resiliency provisions for newly issued Clean Water Act National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits in Massachusetts.

The "Major Storm and Flood Events Plan" provisions require permittees to develop and implement a resiliency plan that looks out near-term (20-30 years) and long-term (80-100 years) and consider the

worst-case climate scenarios and vulnerabilities to the utility's critical infrastructure and all its assets. The plan goes beyond identifying climate vulnerabilities, requiring mitigation measures a utility must consider and a schedule of when the utility plans to implement said measures to minimize the impact of any future climate event. If any utility asset is updated, the plan also must be updated.

NACWA submitted lengthy comments on EPA Region 1's Draft Permit for the City of Holyoke, MA requesting removal of the provisions prior to finalizing the proposed permits. The comments note the provisions are beyond the scope of a Clean Water Act NPDES permit and EPA's statutory authority. NACWA is following the issue closely, as other states and regions are possibly monitoring this approach and there is concern similar language could start to appear in other permit renewals.

Summary: Current law requires the State Air Resources Board, by July 1, 2025, to develop, in consultation with specified stakeholders, a framework for measuring and then reducing the average carbon intensity of the materials used in the construction of new buildings, including those for residential uses. Current law requires the framework to include a comprehensive strategy for the state's building sector to achieve a 40% net reduction in greenhouse gas emissions of building materials, as determined from a baseline calculated using a certain 2026 report, if that report is adequate, or as specified. Current law requires that strategy to achieve this target as soon as possible, but no later than December 31, 2035, provides for an interim target of 20% net reduction by December 31, 2030, authorizes the state board to adjust the interim target, as provided, and requires the established targets to begin no sooner than January 1, 2027. Existing law also requires the state board to form and maintain a technical advisory committee, as described. This bill would, among other changes, extend the date for the development of the framework to December 31, 2026, and would require the state board to develop a comprehensive strategy, by December 31, 2028, rather than by December 31, 2035, to achieve a 40-percent net reduction in greenhouse gas emissions of building materials as soon as possible, but no later than December 31, 2035. The bill would eliminate the interim target of 20% net reduction. The bill would require the baseline described above to be established based on either an industry average of environmental product declarations reported for the 2026 calendar year or on the most relevant, up-to-date information available, as determined by the state board.

This bill would, beginning January 1, 2025, similarly prohibit any person from manufacturing, distributing, selling, or offering for sale in the state any menstrual products that contain regulated PFAS, and requires a manufacturer to use the least toxic alternative when removing regulated PFAS in menstrual products to comply with these provisions. The bill would require a manufacturer of a menstrual product to provide persons that offer the product for sale or distribution in the state with a certificate of compliance stating that the menstrual product is in compliance with these provisions and does not contain any regulated PFAS.

Summary: The Mitigation Fee Act, imposes certain requirements on a local agency that imposes a fee as a condition of approval of a development project that is imposed to provide for an improvement to be constructed to serve the development project, or a fee for public improvements, as specified. The bill would require the state board to allocate the Waterway Recovery Account moneys to each regional board on a proportional basis, based on moneys generated in each region, and would require the regional boards to allocate those moneys to third parties, with priority given to third parties that will undertake projects with multiple benefits that provide greenspace within disadvantaged communities, as provided.

Summary: The Planning and Zoning Law requires each county and city to adopt a comprehensive, long-term general plan for its physical development, and the development of certain lands outside its boundaries, that includes, among other mandatory elements, a housing element. Current law also authorizes the legislative body of a city or a county to adopt ordinances establishing requirements for parking. This bill would require a public agency, as defined, to allow entities with underutilized parking to share their underutilized parking with the public, public agencies, or other entities, if those entities submit a shared parking agreement, as defined, to the public agency, and information demonstrating the benefits of the proposed shared parking agreement. The bill would require a public agency to allow parking spaces identified in a shared parking agreement to count toward meeting automobile parking requirements for a new or existing development or use, including, but not limited to, shared parking in underutilized spaces and in parking lots and garages that will be constructed as part of the development or developments when specified conditions regarding the distance between the entities that will share the parking are met. The bill would require a public agency to approve the shared parking agreement if it includes a parking analysis using peer-reviewed methodologies developed by a professional planning association, as specified. The bill would require a public agency to decide whether to approve or deny the shared parking agreement and determine how many parking spaces can be reasonably shared between uses to fulfill parking requirements if the shared parking agreement does not include this parking analysis. If the public agency is required to decide whether to approve or deny an agreement for specified developments under these provisions, the bill would require the public agency to notify all property owners within 300 feet of the shared parking spaces of the proposed agreement and to hold a public meeting if it receives a request to do so within 14 days of notifying property owners, as provided. The bill would specify that these notification and public meeting requirements would not apply to public agencies that enact an ordinance that provides for shared parking agreements, including ordinances enacted before January 1, 2024.

The bill would define an "extremely affordable adaptive reuse project" for these purposes to mean a multifamily housing development project that involves retrofitting and repurposing of a residential or commercial building that currently allows temporary dwelling or occupancy, and that meets specified affordability requirements, including that 100% of the units be dedicated to lower income households, 50% of which shall be dedicated to very low income households, as specified. Because the bill would require local officials to provide a higher level of service, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.
